OVA Board Approves Painting, Deck Policies

The OVA Board gave final approval to a new painting policy and a new deck policy at its Nov. 15 meeting. Both will be posted on the Berger bulletin board within 15 days of the approval.

The purpose of the painting policy is to assure a harmonious appearance through careful selection of exterior colors. Trim paint that complements the body color enhances the exterior design. The guidelines apply to both maintained and non-maintained areas. All exterior painting and staining require an approved application from the Architectural Office. Paint chip and stain samples are required. A palette of approved colors is available in the Architectural Office. All units of duplexes, triplexes and fourplexes must be painted the same colors and at the same time. Colors not on the palette will be considered. A paint chip is required.

President's Message

The board has received additional feedback from the community regarding the Central Complex area. After reviewing the 2030 group suggestions and the additional feedback from the community, the board is ready to move forward with



exploring ideas for the Central Complex area with a professional planner.

As required by law, we have reserves to pay for the renovation to the CAC building, but we need the assistance of a professional planner to advise us on what we need to do for code compliance and to use the Central Complex area efficiently.

Some residents may feel uneasy about exploratory planning, but we must be open-minded and look at all prospects. It is essential to keep the community informed during the planning stage, which will be required in the scope of work for the planner.

We can learn from experience, such as when the CAC was built in 2006. There was community outrage about the cost, so it was downsized, and hindsight tells us we should have gone with the larger building and avoided paying rent for office space. I would like to see planning appropriately done to save us money in the future by not having to redo it all over again.

For years, some residents have been concerned that a new Berger is in the plans. A new Berger is neither planned nor part of the plan we will request at the present time. Major construction of that type would take a vote of the community, as was done when the golf course was purchased. OVA cannot take on a huge loan until the golf course loan is substantially paid, which will be about five years.

I suggest we approach the planning stage for the Central Complex Area with an open mind to achieve a well-thought-out plan we will be proud of.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Oakmont Emergency Preparedness: Emergency drillconductedOctober14.Fifty-sevenOakmontand Villages at WildOak (VWO) volunteers participated, with 168 emergency messages handled and 65 reports from Oakmont and VWO neighborhoods. Some MYN neighborhoods participated, with over 40% of Oakmont neighborhoods now organized using MYN procedures. Plans are underway for larger participation in future drills. Volunteers are still needed in all areas, including OEPC board, neighborhood radio operators and message handlers.

Golf Advisory: Golf for the period is up year over year with play on Sugarloaf exceeding expectations. Courses are in very good condition. Restaurant was profitable for the most recent period. New rates have been announced for 2024. Size of events is trending down.

Hiring, training and retaining staff remain difficult. Leaky roof over the kitchen, grill and banquet center has been replaced. Work on trees remains active. At least 40 people walk on the courses every day when they should not be there. The danger cannot be overstated. Events presented by the golf club to the community mostly sell out.

Architectural: Since the last board report in August, there were 60 standard violations (juniper complaints, no application project work, weeds, overgrown plantings, parking and storage) and 121 AC Firewise Home Visit violations. There are 181 violations active at this time.

Fifty-five fences were recently checked for compliance with OVA policy; only one was not

compliant. There have been approximately 1,324 applications processed this year to date.

Volunteer Resource: In October, the committee held its second open house for volunteer opportunities. Despite significant advertising, the event was not well attended. The majority of those who attended signed up for a new volunteer opening. The three broad categories of volunteerism in Oakmont-administrative service, club service and community service-all need to be clarified in the New Resident Packets. There are many openings in Lifelong Learning, Volunteer Helpers, the Emergency Preparedness Committee and the AARP Foundation Tax-Aide project. In the New Resident Questionnaire, 37% of responders have indicated that they have some interest in volunteerism. The committee is currently exploring ways to encourage volunteerism as a means of strengthening our sense of community.

Welcome: Volunteers are responsible for reviewing the New Resident Packet with new residents and taking them on tours of facilities. Requests come through the OVA office, Nextdoor, the OVA website and articles in the *Oakmont News* and are passed on to the committee leads for assignments to volunteers. Material for the packets is printed in the OVA office. Chair is now Barbara Sater, with former Chair Katy Carrell continuing as a committee member.

DECK POLICY AND PAINTING REVISIONS

Board approved and adopted the Architectural Committee's Deck and Paint Revision Policies effective immediately. Management will notify association members of the new policies by posting them on the Berger bulletin board within 15 days of adoption.

DECK POLICY

MENIOTA

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All new and replacement deck surfaces attached to or immediately adjacent to the home must be constructed of Class A, Class B or approved nonflammable materials. Nonflammable materials include lightweight concrete and metal products such as aluminum. Class A or nonflammable materials are preferred.

Railings and gates on or adjacent to the deck or within five feet of the house must be constructed of Class A or approved nonflammable materials. Railings on or adjacent to the deck greater than five feet from the house must be of Class A, Class B or approved nonflammable materials. Requirements for underdeck enclosures are outlined in the policy, which is available from the Architectural Committee.

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 1 THE DOVER QUARTET AND A HOLIDAY CELEBRATION

Our December concert showcases the artistic excellence of one of the finest string quartets in the country, making their third appearance at Oakmont. Receiving accolades for their playing from critics and audiences alike, The Dover Quartet will present an exciting program of works by three entirely different composers appealing to all tastes.

The concert will begin with the exuberant Quartet in G minor opus 74 by Haydn, nicknamed "The Rider" due to the seemingly galloping theme of the last movement. The program ends with the uplifting string quartet number nine by Shostakovich. Written after a particularly difficult period when three personal relationships turned out to be disastrous, Shostakovich finally was happily married and dedicated this quartet to his new wife. This is generally a lighter, less complicated work than some of his previous quartets, although containing some dark currents. It is written in five movements to be played without a break.

In between these contrasting pieces, we're delighted to introduce the Oakmont audience to the African -American composer Florence Price, who wrote prolifically-symphonies, chamber music, choral, concertos together with many vocal pieces based on spirituals, which were often sung by the great Marian Anderson. Relatively unknown until recent years, her works are now getting a lot of attention on stages across the world. Price's Ouartet in G major epitomizes her general style incorporating European classicism with her ancestral music of the southern United States. The work comprises two contrasting movements, the second being an impressive set of variations based on the style of an American folk song. I'm so delighted that we have a chance to hear her music in Oakmont.

As a recognition of the holiday season and, I confess, as an enticement for a large turnout, we are serving wine and goodies after the concert. We really hope that you, together with friends and neighbors come to hear these wonderful artists playing extraordinary music.

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FANNY, THE "GODDESS OF PÉTANQUE"

According to legend, Fanny was a café waitress who invited 0-13 losers to kiss her on the cheek as consolation



when they ordered a pastis to drown their sorrow. One day a losing player with whom she had some past grievance appeared for his consolation but Fanny "turned the other cheek," offering instead her backside.

With the kiss that followed, a tradition was born. Losing 0-13 became "being Fannied," and nearly all Pétanque Clubs

have a Fanny in some form. The Oakmont Club's Fanny has been something of a lucky charm-although she has been present for all of the club's tournaments for the last six years in case needed, there have been no shutout tournament games.

NEW CONSENSUS ON FOOT FAULTS

Since Pétanque rules require that both feet remain planted inside the circle until a thrown boule hits the ground, how to handle foot faults-stepping on or outside the circle or lifting a foot off the groundhas been a recurrent issue. One argument is that the offending player should be given an official warning (in umpired tournaments a yellow card). A second warning would then disqualify a thrown boule and have it removed from the terrain. The other point of view is that the boule was thrown against the rules and should be immediately disqualified and removed with any boules disturbed from the throw restored to their original locations.

However, there is virtually never evidence that a throw's success was due to the foot fault. The idea that stepping on the circle or lifting a foot must certainly or even probably have enabled a good throw or shot seems implausible. Therefore, the international Pétanque umpire community has endorsed the view that a player committing a foot fault should receive an official warning but nothing on the ground should be changed.

In non-umpired friendly or tournament play, this effectively means that there is no penalty for a foot fault. However, the opposing team is certainly justified in calling the violation to the attention of the offending player and insisting that the player observe the rule.

The club has boules to lend while you're learning, and you'll be playing right away. No dues are required—just sign up to be on the club roster.

GEEK WEEK TWEEK

In case people didn't realize it, I'm a big science geek. So, when Peter asked for articles, I naturally decided to look into the physics of pickleball.

The physics of pickleball pretty much revolves around spin. Before going bounces off at 950 rpm, and a backspin starting at 825 rpm bounces off at 325 rpm.

An experiment was also done to see what effect spin had on how far the ball bounced. A top spin ball at 1400 rpm bounced 22 feet from where it hit the court on the first bounce. In case you didn't know that's one half the length of a pickleball court. A flat no spin ball hit to the same location on the court only bounced 11 feet and a back spin ball bounced 8 feet. What does that mean for a player trying to return a ball? It means you better be paying attention to how your opponent hit the ball. Don't forget that if you're volleying the ball it didn't bounce and will have whatever spin your opponent put on the ball. Do I think about the physics of pickleball while playing? No! But I do try and pay attention to how my opponent hits the ball and learn through experience how to hit the return so it goes over the net, stays in bounds, and is so high my partner or I don't end up eating a pickleball for lunch. Trolling the Internet, I found some YouTube videos on the topic. Unfortunately, I didn't find any equations to wow people. However, they did do experiments with some interesting results. They have a special ball machine that can put top, no, or back spin on a pickleball. First interesting observation is after the bounce, regardless of the spin, the ball bounces up with top spin. A top spin ball starting at 1475 rpm bounces off the court at 1875 rpm, a flat no spin ball

round robins. OAKMONT CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

The 124th annual Christmas Bird Count (CBC) season is coming up fast! Oakmont birders and friends from nearby will count bird species on Sunday, December 17, rain or shine. We'll gather at the Berger Center parking lot at 8:30 a.m. and divide into teams of 3-4 for the morning effort. Lunch break is at 12:45 for a BYO picnic at the tables behind Berger.

Last year, when we gathered for lunch, all were very excited to share stories and hear about three species

observed: a Virginia Rail at one of the golf course ponds, a Red-breasted Sapsucker on a ridge, and a flock of six Whitethroated Sparrows near West Rec. Center. Ideally, we count until 3 p.m. or so, but for some, that's a long day. Do what you can!

CBC stats show us that the morning tends to yield the most species and individuals within each species group. So, if you want to count part of the day, then it's the morning. What will we find this year?



CBC week begins three days before and ends three days after our count day. So, from Thursday, December 14 through Wednesday, December 20 we can tally species. Last year, six of us did a sweep of the major areas around Oakmont on Friday morning before count day and will do it again this year. We welcome experienced birders who want to join in from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. As you know, any given day in the field can be very birdy, or not. By doing a "mini" count the Friday before our Sunday event, we take the best numbers for each area and use them in the final tally.

While we do not officially gather at dark on count day to "owl" Oakmont, owl species heard or seen

Great Horned Owls and Western Screech Owls are common. Folks who keep bird feeders on their decks and patios are also welcome to provide their observations to the group leaders at the email given below.

Oakmont CBC Leadership: Dawna and James Foreman, who have participated in the Oakmont CBC since 2016, will be leading again this year. Last year each team used the eBird field app to record species, then submitted a "trip list" by having an experienced eBirder report to our consolidated eBird list. Oakmont is just one of the 12 counts in Santa Rosa within a 15-mile diameter, typical of each CBC effort across the US and around the world. Our Santa Rosa CBC leader, Gene Hunn, is delighted to receive our group's final tally in eBird.

Join us! We look forward to birding with old friends as well as welcoming new, experienced, bird watchers on Sunday, December 17. Email Dawna at Mojobird22@gmail. Do you use the eBird App in the field? Please include that info in your email and let us know your availability for the day.
