Klyn, Oliver and Gladstone Win OVA Board Seats

Former board member Heidi Klyn was the top vote getter in a field of eight candidates seeking three vacancies on the OVA Board election on April 1. She was closely followed by Matt Oliver and Jerry Gladstone. Five other candidates, including two board incumbents, finished far back in the race that

drew 1,916 ballots, one of the largest in recent years, for an OVA board

The election had been one of the most visible in recent years with campaign signs all over Oakmont for weeks, a Candidates' Forum and many well-attended candidate meet-

Klyn, who served two previous terms on the board, garnered 1,221. Oliver polled 1,194, just 27 behind Klyn. Jerry Gladstone was the third successful candidate with 1,129 votes.

A group calling itself Grassroots Oakmont had endorsed the three and posted its own election signage and had campaigned vigorously on social media sites.

The new directors succeed board President Marianne Neufeld, who chose not to run for a second term. Two other incumbents, Iris Harrell and Jeff Neuman, were defeated.

The 1,916 ballots far outpaced recent years of board elections. The member vote approving an increase in dues in part to buy the golf courses was more than 2,600

The newly seated board postponed election of its president and other officers at its next meeting, April 16. Director Mark Randol said that would allow members to learn more about their new colleagues as they weigh their selections.

User Groups Move Through First Phase of Work

Five User Groups presented their initial findings at a Workshop April 2 at the Berger Center. Christel Antone, general manager, and project lead with ArchiLOGIX, explained that the work of the User Groups is in progress and encouraged Oakmont residents to stay informed about the activities of the user groups by visiting the Central Complex Area section of the OVA Website Home page, oakmontvillage.com/central-complex-area-design.

Joy Bellomo and Jess Marzak presented the findings of the Fitness User Group that included details on conversations held with all of the sports groups currently using the Central Complex as well as yoga, billiards, tennis, pickleball and the strength and balance class. Fitness activities requesting additional space include the fitness center, billiards and pickleball. Specific recommendations for the CAC cabana area were made that included increasing the usability of the area by adding retractable doors, adding a gate to access a picnic area on the east side of the pool and installing sunshades.

Carol Pence and Rhonda Greer presented the Indoor Gatherings User Group findings from interviews with large and small clubs that use both the Berger and the CAC. Recommendations ranged from increasing the storage space for clubs to specific needs for technology improvements in the buildings in the Central Complex. Parking spaces for golf carts was suggested as were racks for regular, electric and three-wheeler bikes. A sub-group has focused on what attributes are important for having a coffee shop in the Central area.

Marilyn Pahr and Tudy Calegari presented the Arts and Education Group summarizing their conversations with the Technology Center, library and crafts and card clubs. They recommended an all-purpose Makers Space that would provide furniture, equipment and storage specifically for crafters and artists. For the library, an enhanced meeting room was proposed as a relaxed place for book clubs, speakers and display cases. Other ideas included an AV room for producing videos, a memory lab to create oral histories, a ceramics room and a woodworking space.

Carol Toth presented the Outdoor User Group findings explaining that her team sought to identify projects that will fit the unused spaces in the CAC parcel with the goal of modernizing the current look and feel and incorporating eco-friendly, firewise and drought tolerate landscaping options. Their key recommendations included an outdoor event plaza, enhanced and expanded patio spaces, a small landscape park and a walking trail loop around the Complex.

The Administration User Group presented their findings and suggested an OVA office space that would include a reception area, additional meeting rooms, file storage, a community bulletin board, quiet zones and a community information center.

In addition to the five user groups, a Walk Audit was conducted on April 11 to generate ideas to increase the safety, walkability, accessibility and appearance of the Central Complex. Information on self-conducted audits, which can be done through April 19, is available on the OVA website.

The PowerPoint is also online at oakmontvillage. com/central-complex-area-design. On April 15, individual User Groups will begin a series of intensive meetings with ArchiLOGIX.

In honor of Earth Day on April 22, the tour features four Oakmont gardens chosen because they showcase community-wide landscaping objectives of being firewise, drought-tolerant, attractive and habitatenhancing for native wildlife, with an emphasis on use of local native plant species and cultivars. Music and refreshments will enhance the festivities, and free plants, wildflower seeds and Water Smart card decks from Sonoma Water Agency will be available, while supplies last.

According to OESC Chair Lesli Lee, each garden exhibits creative and attractive ways to balance habitat needs and landscape aesthetics with the practical realities of being firewise and drought tolerant.

"Each garden is unique, blending native and complementary plants that offer vital wildlife habitat qualities of food, water, cover and shelter for raising young," Lee said. "It's inspiring to see what can be accomplished in our community. Plus, this is an ideal time of year to see local flora in full bloom, along with a variety of pollinators."

Residents may stop by the gardens any time between 2–4 p.m.; addresses are 6518 Stone Bridge Road, 6524 Stonecroft Terrace, 6421 Meadow Creek Lane, and 6309 Meadowridge Drive. Please wear stable walking shoes and leave pets at home.

When this form accompanies the patient to the hospital, it can help serve as a valuable resource for equipping emergency center personnel with crucial details. The captains at Fire Station 7 in Oakmont are supportive of this effort and want to remind everyone to update the medication list as frequently as needed. Current medications are one of the most important things you can provide first responders.

To help lessen the stress associated with a medical emergency, complete a form for each household member and place it in a highly visible location, such as the refrigerator door or near the front entrance. Remember to create extra copies in preparation for any unforeseen circumstances and to include in a go-bag.

MYN neighborhood leaders are asked to check in with neighbors, especially those at higher risk because perhaps they are frail, bedridden or don't see well. Please help your neighbors fill out this form.

If you print it at home, remember that first responders will be looking for a bright yellow color.

Vaccine Clinic on April 30

OVA is once again hosting a Vaccine Clinic Day on Tuesday, April 30 at the Berger Center, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. This vaccine clinic is offering the XBB COVID Vaccine, RSV (ages 60+), and Pneumonia (Prevnar 20).

The CDC has recommended people 65 and older should receive an additional dose of any updated (2023–2024 Formula) COVID-19 vaccine (i.e., Moderna, Novavax, Pfizer-BioNTech) at least 4 months following the previous dose of an updated (2023–2024 Formula) COVID-19 vaccine.

This means that those (65+) who received their last Covid vaccine in 2023 are now recommended to receive another dose. If you attended the Covid vaccine clinic in January of this year, you do not fall under this recommendation.

You can make an appointment at www.safeway. com/vaccinations/group-clinic/OVSR.

Please bring your medical and prescription card to the clinic at the time of your appointment plus the printed version of the consent form you receive at the time of booking your appointment. There will also be consent forms at the clinic, or you can pick one up from the OVA office. If you are not insured, please prepay with the Safeway pharmacy by calling (707) 766-9477. Safeway is unable to bill Kaiser members.

rely on our GM to lead and run the OVA operation with our oversight but not "hands-on" directives. I held regular meetings where key activities were reviewed with Christel and our vice president, Olga, so we could respond effectively to support our OVA goals.

Working closely with Christel, confirms that we have the best GM we could possibly have—and, in my opinion, the best we've had during the 18 years I've lived in Oakmont.

Christel brings a wealth of business experience and accountability. She is committed to maintaining open communication and transparency and understands our community

In 2023, our insurance company canceled our coverage due to fires from 2017 through 2020, which hit us hard. The available insurance for 2023 had a very high premium and required a portion of self-insured coverage. We are very pleased that for 2024 we obtained full coverage for a lower premium than expected.

I'm happy to report the golf course is doing well, continuing to make upgrades to the course as agreed, despite having to remove many trees damaged in the last storm. The restaurant's feedback is more positive about the dining experience and the many special events are popular with most totally booked.

This board recognized the community concern and focused on community safety education. The board voted to enter a contract with KLD to do a traffic evacuation study for Oakmont, which gave us valuable insight into evacuation route potential and estimated evacuation times. We also passed a resolution to engage an evacuation specialist to put together an evacuation plan for Oakmont, and that agreement will be finalized soon.

On the recommendation of the Long-Range Planning Committee, the board voted to approve hiring a community planner to look at the findings of the 2030 process, engage the residents, and prepare 3 concept drawings for the central activity complex (CAC) to present to the community. In preparation for this, the board approved a parking study of the CAC area usage.

We collaborated closely with Burbank Housing to secure an additional Emergency Vehicle Access (EVA) route through the South East Santa Rosa project (formerly Elnoka) property. When completed, the EVA will be controlled by the city and could provide local residents and the greater community with an additional way in and out during emergencies. We are happy with this outcome and grateful for the support.

I am proud to say Oakmont Village Association is in excellent financial condition. The main reason is that Elke, our Treasurer for the past 8 years, has worked to get our reserves and budget in good standing, and Christel keeps a watchful eye on the details of our budget and expenditures. Our strong financial standing allowed us to consider the recommendation of our Treasurer and vote to make an early payment of \$300,000 towards our loan principal. This will help pay the loan off sooner and save on interest.

It has been my pleasure to serve as President this past year and I look forward to serving our community in other capacities.

The Audit is intended to generate ideas for helping to bring a cohesive character to the interplay between outdoor space and activity buildings.

April 11 and self-conducted participants can choose one of four different routes in and around the Complex. A questionnaire filled out by participants looks at the safety, accessibility and walkability of the route as well as the aesthetics, lighting and landscaping. The Walk Audit does not include Oakmont streets that are under City jurisdiction.

NEW RULES FOR 2024

USA Pickleball is the national governing body of American pickleball that formulates and interprets all the rules of the sport. This body published the first official rulebook in March of 1984. There were 92 proposed rule changes for 2024. Out of those, 27 were accepted and placed in the rule handbook. Many were minor changes and several were just slight word changes. Most were for tournament play.

Noteworthy for recreation play are Rules 7.L and 11.A.. Rule 7.L is the carry rule, with any carry now being a fault even if accidental. 11.A is the double hit rule, stating double hits are allowed as long as it happens in one continuous motion. A reminder we are playing recreation play not tournament play, in many cases, you can do a replay (except line callsthey stand).

One other rule I thought would be good to remember even though it doesn't happen that often, is rule 11.E, the cracked ball rule. If all the players agree that a cracked ball affected the outcome of a rally, a replay should occur.

I have received a hard copy or the 2024 Official Rule Book, for you to view. I will have it available at the courts.

Enough on ruleshere is a paddle update. We have received the new OWL quiet paddle for our members to try. This is the elongated power model. It has vibration dampening construction for arm

She is the first woman in Sonoma County to receive the Switzer Environmental Fellowship and went on to become the recipient of a Switzer leadership grant to establish the first watershed station in the Sonoma Valley protecting and restoring local streams and watersheds. She has worked for various organizations including Greenpeace, American Friends Service Committee, Marine Mammal Center, Russian Riverkeeper and Audubon Canyon Ranch.

We will also discuss next steps in the implementation of the Oakmont Democratic Alliance Action Plan presented earlier in the month.

RIGHT-OF-WAY FOR QUAIL?

Cute signs around Oakmont proclaim that quail have the right-of way. Besides being our state bird, the California Quail has a special place in the hearts of Oakmonters. Hearing the characteristic "Chi-CA-

go" call of male "sentries," watching a flock of quail devouring backyard seeds, and seeing fluffball nestlings scurry into the bushes have delighted us for decades.

The California Quail is a midsize gallinaceous bird, related to chickens, turkeys, and pheasants. Quail are easily recognized by their plump shape and striking feather pattern. Males have a prominent "topknot" head ornament made of six overlapping

black feathers; females' topknot is much smaller.

Quail are highly social, mostly ground-dwelling, nonmigratory birds who travel in gregarious flocks (except during nesting season), feeding on seeds,

flowers, and insects. Nests are minimal—just a scrape on the ground, usually in a dense thicket of shrubs. Females lay up to 15 eggs in late spring and sometimes produce more than one brood per season. Nestlings are precocious, running and foraging for food within hours of hatching.

In the 10 years I have lived here, I've noticed a definite reduction of quail

in my west Oakmont neighborhood. More than those right-of-way signs, a sustainable quail population in Oakmont requires what all animals—including humans—need: food, water, and shelter for avoiding predators and a secure place to raise young. Quail experience a high natural mortality rate, which we can help offset by providing suitable habitat with sufficient dense plant cover, food, and water, by keeping pet cats indoors, and by avoiding trimming shrubs and trees during nesting season, March-August.

Yoga is exercise, and exercise becomes yoga when it becomes difficult. We practice on Sunday and Mondays at the West Rec. at 3 p.m. There is no class on April 15. Our class is one hour, doing 26 postures and 2 breathing exercises using the Bikram method, adjusting for flexibility. We do not follow the normal aging process of "losing 10 percent of your muscle mass every decade after age 40. Ditto bone mass." (*Younger Next Year*) "Everybody can do yoga." (*Revolution Yoga*)

We share at class what has worked for us, helping others and ourselves bring home a short series of stretches/postures for the days not taking class. Physical Therapy is for injuries/pain. My experience from a shoulder injury was yoga after physical therapy. Yoga is "no pain, no pain." (*Tony Being Yoga*)

The class begins with a breathing exercise and the first posture starts by bringing your arms over your head. Easier said than done. The fore mentioned shoulder injury prevents me from doing that as the posture dialogue states. I hold my arms up until it's difficult and bring them down slowly without collapsing. I'm doing yoga by finding a way to lift my arms without pain, but holding them up a little longer than wanted, then bringing them down before I'm overwhelmed—finding balance between the mind and body.

That's the first 5 minutes, come and find out what's next.

There are no dues. The only expense is personal accessories. Bring your yoga mat.

Since 2017, the Valley of the Moon Children's Center has been evolving to respond to the State of California's overhaul of the Foster Care System, known as the Continuum of Care Reform, or CCR. Instead of holding children for up to 30 days, all group homes must place endangered children in foster home within 10 days. The approach acknowledges a child's traumatic experiences, basically changing the way you look at a youth. "It's not what's wrong with you, it's what's happened to you. We're building a relationship quickly in a different way," according to Nick Honey, Retired Director of the County's Family, Youth and Children's Services.

Learn about the vital role the Valley of the Moon Children's Foundation plays in supporting the work of the Valley of the Moon Children's Center by awarding \$150,000 in scholarships to 42 foster youth, serving 104 foster youth through the Valley of the Moon Children's Center Dental Program and providing \$41,476 to 40 scholars facing challenging situations that threatened to end their schooling.

INTERMEDIATE HIKE: APRIL 25 TENNESSEE VALLEY

This 6-mile hike with 1,000' elevation gain is somewhat steep in places. We'll climb the Miwok Trail out of Tennessee Valley (in Mill Valley) to the Coyote Ridge Trail, which (if we're not fogged in) provides stunning 360-degree views of the ocean, bay, valleys, and Mount Tam.

LONG HIKE: APRIL 25 TOMALES POINT


