## **Getting To a Master Plan**

For the past year, we have been asking for and receiving comments from residents and user groups about what they would like the future of the central activity center to be, and our community continues to deliver excellent support and engagement from our volunteers. Members participated in community conversations and work groups, submitting valuable and well-organized information through the 2030 initiative about the current needs, the ideas and the concerns regarding the Central Complex. More recently five user groups provided planners with specific needs, preferences and aspirations for the central area.

Now it's time to take the next step for creating a long-term master plan for the central area.

Mitch Conner and his team from Archilogix have created three integrated layouts or concepts for our review and consideration. His team has focused on getting as many of the community ideas and requests included in each of the three integrated layouts.

We are excited to invite the community to view these concepts in developing a master plan and be able to share feedback. First, we'll introduce the three concepts at our June 27 Town Hall from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Berger Center.

Then the concepts will be exhibited at the Central Complex for three weeks from July 8–26. Within those dates, on select days and times we'll have community volunteers available to answer questions about the concepts and process. This exciting first step lets us review potential plans and share feedback.

We realize that the community is eager to learn as much as possible about the designs, costs and next steps. There are still some activities to complete before we know the answers to important questions about estimating costs, funding options and timelines. As we get more insights and details, we look forward to sharing this information. We will continue to announce target dates when they become available.

We want to hear your feedback so please attend the Town Hall June 27 and then plan on stopping by the Central Complex during the July exhibit of the three integrated concepts.

There will be several ways to share your feedback regarding these CAC master plan layouts. You can ask questions at the June 27 Town Hall. You may write and submit feedback at the CAC July Plan exhibit (July 8–26). We will also be scheduling community conversations as another way to gather community feedback. #### DOCUMENTARY CARVED IN SILENCE WITH FILMMAKER FELICIA LOWE

DATE: Wednesday, July 10

*Carved in Silence* tells the story of Chinese immigrants who were detained at the United States Immigration Station at Angel Island in San Francisco Bay during the little-known Chinese Exclusion era.

The Chinese Exclusion Act was a United States federal law signed by President Chester A. Arthur on May 6, 1882, prohibiting all immigration of Chinese laborers for 10 years. The law made exceptions for merchants, teachers, students, travelers and diplomats. It was the first significant law restricting immigration into the United States. The law remained in force until the passage of the Magnuson Act in 1943, which repealed the exclusion and allowed 105 Chinese immigrants to enter the United States each year.

Felicia Lowe is an award-winning independent media producer, director, and writer with 40 years of production experience. Her documentaries *Chinese Couplets, Carved in Silence, Chinatown and China: Land of My Father* reveal the unique experiences of Chinese in America while underscoring our common humanity. Prior to producing documentaries, she was one of the first Asian female television news reporters and worked in children's programming. A descendent of Angel Island detainees, she's been a leader in the preservation and restoration of this National Historic Landmark.

Below are excerpts from a Mayo Clinic report on the characteristics of addiction. Do you have any? If you do, you can join the ranks of your happy fellow pickleball addicts:

Common characteristics or factors of addiction include: Adventurous or thrill-seeking, attention deficit disorder diagnosis, comfort with secrets or lying, desire for immediate gratification, difficulty in accepting responsibility, difficulty with selfregulation, early childhood trauma, exposure to drugs and alcohol, impulsivity, mental health conditions like anxiety and depression, neuroticism or high levels of sensitivity or nervousness, obsessive and compulsive behaviors.

Watch for these signs of addiction:

• Always wanting more: Feeling that you must use the substance or engage in the behavior regularlydaily or even several times a day.

• Inability to stop: Failed attempts to stop, even when you want to, or not being able to follow rules that you have set for yourself.

• Increased tolerance: Needing more of the drug or behavior to get the same effect.

• Intense cravings: Having strong urges that block out other thoughts.

• Loss of control: Difficulty in controlling use or behavior, even though you know it's causing problems in your life or causing you physical or psychological harm.





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

#### NORTH BAY HONOR FLIGHTS

The members of the Oakmont Veterans Club would like to bring a special matter to your attention. We have all seen recent images of our D-Day vets being honored overseas, and while our hearts and visions are full of those images we want to say a word about special events conducted here at home.

Every year there is an ongoing event to honor all the disabled and terminally ill veterans that served in our nation's conflicts and wars. Those events are called "Honor Flights." The veterans travel from all over our country to visit memorials and tour our nation's capital. They are sponsored by the regional veteran's organizations that the Veterans Administration has designated as "hubs." The hubs schedule flights on separate days so there are not more visiting veterans in the Capitol than can be accommodated.

The vets must also be accompanied by "Guardians" who help with whatever assistance the vets may need. The Guardians expenses are not fully paid by the hubs because the local groups simply cannot afford to pay all of the expenses out of their budgets, so they have to raise funds to help offset the costs. That is why the hubs work to raise funds for the veterans and companions.

This year our region was granted the status of "hub." It was founded by a 501-C3 organization called "The North Bay Honor Flight," and they have scheduled their premiere flight tentatively for April 28-30, 2025. The point of all this is to ask for any donations you can help with. April 2025 seems a long way off, but there is much to do, and we want the first flight to be spectacular.



#### WHAT IS INTERVAL TRAINING?

Recently, I've been asked what Interval Training is. The definition of Interval Training is alternating between short bursts of intense exercise and brief periods of rest. In most cases we are talking about aerobic exercise but interval training can be done with light weight or body weight exercises.

The time that your bursts last and the time that you rest may vary from one person to the next. The bursts usually last between 20-60 seconds and the rest can be from 10-20 seconds. These routines don't have to be very long, anywhere from 10-20 minutes. Studies have shown that they can burn as much, if not more, calories as a 30-minute constant cardio workout.

If you would like to try a weight training version of interval training, I hold classes Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 2 p.m. at the lower West Recreation Center. We perform 10 exercises for 30 seconds with 10 seconds between each exercise to get ready for the next exercise. We perform 4 sets and have a 2-minute break between each set. The session lasts about 40 minutes, including warm-up and cool-down.

The first session is free and then \$10 for each session after that. The only requirement is that you can get up and down off the floor. Working on that ability alone will help keep you independent.

A word to the wise: any exercise program needs to be set with care. Correct shoes, plenty of water are musts. Know your own limitations and plan around what is safe for you. OHI classes are vigorous and large. If you have been away from physical exercise for a while, you may check with your doctor and begin a routine with caution. Beginning in a smaller, more gentle environment, could be considered, at least at first.
