OVA has introduced a new, user-friendly system to help residents report maintenance issues at Oakmont's community facilities. Starting this week, QR codes will be posted at the Central, Berger, East, and West facilities.

How It Works:

- 1. Scan: Use smart phone's camera to scan the QR code located in the facility.
- 2. Report: A link will lead to the OVA maintenance portal, MaintainX. Here, residents can describe the issue, specify its

location, and upload photos if necessary.

- 3. Submit: Once report is submitted, it goes directly to the OVA maintenance team for prompt attention. Benefits of the New System:
- Convenience: Residents can easily report issues from within the facility.
- Efficiency: The digital report provides detailed information and visual evidence for quicker resolution.
- Direct Reporting: This new system ensures maintenance requests are addressed promptly.

MYN FOCUSES ON SUB-HOAS

Meet Your Neighbors (MYN) provides emergency preparedness and disaster response education in Oakmont. MYN leaders are asking for your help in establishing emergency preparedness protocols in every neighborhood, and transition them to MYN.

Recently MYN has been focusing attention on Oakmont's sub-HOAs, which amount to nearly half of our friends and neighbors. To establish sub-HOAs as "official" MYN neighborhoods and increase participation, MYN is in discussions with sub-HOA leaders. So far, 11 of the 37 sub-HOAs have 100% MYN coverage; the remaining 26 sub-HOAs have either partial or no coverage.

Oakmonter Loves All Things Jack London

Less than 15 minutes down the road from Oakmont lies a magical place, featuring shady redwood groves, creeks and a seasonal lake, expansive views, vineyards, meadows, 29 miles of meandering trails and historic buildings, including the Pig Palace, Winery Ruins, Wolf House, Cottage and House of Happy Walls—all within Jack London State Historic Park (JLSHP) in Glen Ellen.

Not surprisingly, Oakmont has a long association with the park, where many

regularly visit, hike and volunteer. Indeed, more than 30 Oakmonters regularly volunteer at the park. Take Bern Lefson, who is one of the most active. The retired aerospace manager and 13-year Oakmont resident has been volunteering at for almost as long and is the Park's 2018 Star Volunteer of the Year. Known affectionately as the Keystone Volunteer, Lefson's record tells the story—more than 2,700 hours driving visitors on carts, leading private tours and serving as council chair.

Lefson has his reasons for pitching in. "I find Jack London (and his wife Charmian) fascinating—farmers, sailors and world travelers, oyster pirates, raconteurs and, oh yes, world-famous authors," he said. "I enjoy meeting people from all over the world who have also been enchanted by stories by and about the Londons and sharing the stories that make Jack and Charmian come alive. My favorite park location is the Wolf House—a magical place rich in beauty and history."

Though JLSHP is a state park, it receives little state funding, mostly through in-kind services. The park has been in the news since a lawsuit was filed against the State Parks for alleged inadequate environmental review, forcing the relocation of Transcendence Theater Company's popular summer performances since 2023 and resulting in a revenue loss of almost \$100,000 a year, according to Susan St. Marie, director of Program and Volunteer Management.

St. Marie says the park has had to become very creative in uncovering new funding sources. She says there are many ways Oakmonters can help, including visiting (\$10 day park pass), becoming a member via a tax-deductible donation (a \$59 membership includes an annual park pass), booking an event at the park or scheduling a special tour or sponsoring a bench or picnic table.

The park's major annual fundraiser gala, "Yesterday's Tomorrow," will be held on Saturday, September 21. Tickets are available on the park's website at jacklondonpark.com.

"The park has so much to offer everyone, and we encourage regular visits to see what's new, especially in the House of Happy Walls' world-class museum, which was completely renovated in 2018 entirely with private funding," said St. Marie. "In 2023, we had more than 80,000 visitors. Oakmonters have always been a significant portion of our visitor and volunteer community, and we invite the local community to visit often. It's always a 'wow experience.'"



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

Oakmont Simulated Emergency Drill

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 5, 9–11 AM

The Oakmont Emergency Preparedness Committee (OEPC) is conducting a simulated emergency drill to exercise our radio communications volunteers and MYN organized neighborhoods. The scenario will be a 7.6 earthquake centered on the Hayward and Rodger's Creek faults that has caused major damage to Oakmont. Electricity, water, and natural gas are cut off, the internet is down, and cell phone service has been disrupted or is severely overloaded.

We have been advised to shelter in place until the full extent of the damage is understood and conditions have been stabilized, which may take several days.

In an actual emergency, using our radio networks, radio volunteers monitor and report on conditions in their neighborhood, relay information to residents as the emergency progresses and request assistance from outside responders as needed. Our neighborhood radio volunteers communicate with other OEPC volunteers at each of the Rec Centers who are in contact with County and City Emergency Operations Centers to supplement 911 services which are overloaded.

NEIGHBORHOOD PARTICIPATION

Neighborhood radio operators will be wearing yellow vests and carrying walkie-talkies. They will go to the neighborhood meeting place to assess the need for assistance.

To participate in this exercise, you can create a simulated condition that requires assistance from Oakmont resources or first responder support for life or property threatening conditions and give it to the radio volunteer to report.

If you don't see a radio volunteer, you may not have one in your neighborhood. Only about 50% of the Oakmont neighborhoods have radio coverage. You or someone in your neighborhood may consider joining our communications team. We provide the radios and training. Very little of your time is required to establish you as a critical resource for your neighbors.

JUST WHEN YOU THINK YOU'VE WON

If you are a friend of Rotary, have been to our fundraisers (the Crab Feed) or just read some of our articles on these pages, you probably know that eradicating Polio has been a mission of Rotary International's for a long time now. Our Polio Plus project and alliances with the Bill Gates Foundation, international health organizations, etc., brought us to the very brink of victory, with only limited cases in Pakistan and Afghanistan remaining.

The outward reach to vaccinate children in the most remote and backward areas of the world has not been easy. It's been a long battle, but recent events in the Mideast now show us how tenuous this goal is. Areas impacted by strife, unrest, military conflict have made possible the reappearance of Polio in Gaza. This unexpected development raises the specter of a

widespread outbreak. Urgency is the key word and it's been reassuring to see how quickly action has begun to vaccinate the 640,000 children under 10.

Rotary along with WHO and other aid agencies helped assemble a well-coordinated game plan which has been implemented. Other countries have stepped as the recent donation of \$5 million by the Sultan of the UAE illustrates. Administering the two doses necessary to each child within a limited time is an enormous task but thankfully everyone has learned what's at stake. It's this kind of response that still lends hope to seeing a day when children and parents can be freed from the ravages of Polio.



Pickleball Corner 🐓

THE SENIOR EDGE

If you're a senior pickleball player, you've likely faced the challenge of going up against younger, faster, and more agile opponents. While it might seem daunting, the good news is that your experience and strategic thinking can give you an edge.

Here are five key tips to help you outsmart younger players on the court:

1. Prioritize Placement and Precise Targeting Over Power: Younger players often rely on their speed

and power, but as a senior player, you can counteract this by focusing on precision. Instead of trying to match their pace, concentrate on placing your shots accurately.

Focus on targeting the middle of the court, where communication between younger, doubles players can break down. Aim for their backhand side often the weaker shot.

2. Keep the Ball in Play: Avoid going for the lines or extreme angles that can backfire, and instead, focus on consistency. The longer the rally, the more likely

they are to get impatient and make an error. 3. Play the Soft Game: Engage younger players in a soft game emphasizing dinks and drop shots. Avoid getting into "paddle battles" or fast-paced exchanges where their quicker reflexes will shine.

4. Avoid Lobs and Drop Volleys: While lobs might work against other seniors, they're less effective against younger players who can quickly track down the ball and counter with an overhead smash.

5. Target Their Feet: When hitting your fourth shot or any volley, aim for the younger player's feet as they move toward the NVZ. This forces them to make awkward returns and prevents them from gaining the upper hand at the net.


LABOR OF LOVE!

A long-time fixture in the Bay Area world of Ikebana, Ron Brown brings innovative, inspiring enthusiasm to Ikebana audiences and his students. Ron's journey in Ikebana began as an outgrowth of his interest in ceramics and the utilitarian use of ceramic vessels for esthetic purposes. He studied with renowned Ikebana teachers beginning with Sogetsu Ikebana



in 1979 studying under Burleigh Fedanzo. In 1986 he became a student of Shuko Kobayashi. In 2007, he became a student of Kika Shibata and continues to study with her today. Ron holds the rank of Komon.

Since his retirement from a 35-year career in the wine industry in Sonoma and Napa counties, Ron has been actively pursuing his passion and love of Ikebana as a second career. Ron teaches Ikebana classes in Sonoma and Marin Counties and demonstrates and exhibits for many groups throughout California and beyond. He teaches a monthly class at Oakmont.

AMERICAN BITTERN VISITS VALLEY OF THE MOON GOLF COURSE

Sharp-eyed Oakmont birder Carol Legg recently spotted an American Bittern visiting a sand trap on the 13th hole of the VOM golf course. She also saw one there last year – so maybe it's becoming a hangout! Bitterns are secretive and notoriously hard to see, as their posture and coloration help them blend in well with dense reeds and cattails of their preferred marshy habitats. Having one visit a sand trap is a surprise and a great opportunity to see an otherwise elusive bird.

The American Bittern is part of the heron family, around the size of a snowy egret but lacking its slender grace. It has a stocky body, a long-pointed bill, and yellow legs, with an overall streaky brown

and buff coloration, including pronounced brown stripes on its head and breast. By extending or contracting its relatively long neck, it can achieve two distinct appearances: tall and thin, or compact like a football. When it wants to disappear among the reeds, it elongates its neck and points its bill upward, becoming as skinny as possible and allowing its vertical stripes to create perfect camouflage.

Bitterns hunt by standing stock-still for very long periods, waiting for a fish or insect to wander close, and then stabbing it with lightning speed. When they do move about, it's with great deliberation and, as bird expert David Sibley writes, an "agonizingly slow gait."

American Bitterns are here year-round in Northern California. In the spring breeding season, in Annadel Park's Ledson Marsh you can sometimes hear their unique call—a weird booming or "oomph-kahloomph" sound, more like a frog than a bird. Altogether a wonderfully strange creature! We're lucky to have one in Oakmont.



GET READY FOR ACTION


The temperature is cooling, and it is much better "tennis weather"—whatever that is—although the searing heat didn't stop play only brought some time adjustments.




