COMMITTEE REPORT

Long Range Planning: On hold regarding the Central Complex pending further direction from the OVA Board. A subcommittee is exploring the 2020 census to provide a demographic summary of Oakmont and to compare to the 2010 census with report to be completed in early 2025.

Meet Your Neighbors: Katy Carrell and staff member Dani Hannigan have completed the digital version of the MYN coverage map. The 2025 Fire Safe Fair is set for April 24, 1–5 p.m.

GOVERNING DOCUMENTS COMMITTEE UPDATE

Board approved charter up to 7 members, 5 members have been approved by committee and will be voted on at January board meeting. Any amendments to the governing documents have been tabled and will be addressed at the January meeting.

ACCEPTANCE OF BOARD SECRETARY POSITION

Jess Marzak accepted position of Board Secretary.

2025 INSURANCE RENEWALS

Approved the Cline Insurance Agency insurance proposals in the amount not to exceed \$290,000 with funds allocated from the operating account.

ELECTION RULES

Approved the revised OVA 2025 Election Rules (in

concept) as recommended by the Board of Directors, to be posted on the Berger bulletin board, on the Oakmont Village website (www.oakmontvillage. com) and available in the OVA office as soon as practicable to allow 28-day review by members of the Association.

BERGER PROJECTOR REPLACEMENT

Approved purchase of a new projector and having the existing projector repaired and used as a backup with a cost not to exceed \$14,000.

COMMITTEE LIAISONS

Director Steve Spillman suggested that board liaisons for committees should not unduly influence committee actions unless they deviate from board policies or violate the law. He also questioned the need for alternate liaisons as they are rarely needed. Director Olga Ydrogo offered that it is helpful to have another individual prepared to step in if necessary.

CENTRAL COMPLEX UPDATE

General Manager Christel Antone said that a meeting with ALX was postponed until January, and there will be more information after that meeting, as nothing has changed since the last update.

As we approach the holiday season, I would like to take a moment to wish everyone a very Happy Holiday! I also want to express my heartfelt gratitude for another wonderful year of serving as your General Manager.

Looking ahead to the new year, I'd like to share a few budgetary updates.

Starting January 1, 2025, the OVA dues will increase from \$125 to \$128.50 per month per person. I am pleased to share that this modest increase represents less than 3%—below the current rate of inflation—helping to keep our community affordable while supporting our continued growth and services. This would not have been possible without the dedication and hard work of our volunteers. Their efforts have been instrumental in managing costs and ensuring that the increase remains as modest as possible, and I am extremely grateful for their contributions.

Additionally, I want to remind everyone that there are various payment options available for your dues. You were recently informed that some based on some bank chargers, payment methods may carry small additional, and we encourage you to consider these options when making your payment. For those who prefer to avoid fees, we strongly encourage you to consider Auto-Draft (ACH) payments, which remain a free service. Alternatively, mailing a check directly to CFM is another great way to bypass the processing fee entirely.

Oakmont's Route 16 has New Vehicle

Santa Rosa City Bus Route 16, Oakmont's exclusive community shuttle, has a new vehicle making rounds. The 2023 Cutaway Ford E450 mirrors a previous vehicle that served Oakmont, with features that include a zero-stair entry, 20 folding seats, and four wheelchair spaces. There are also eight cameras recording inside and outside movement.

The Oakmont Shuttle runs from 8:15 a.m. to 4:10 p.m., Monday through Friday, with stops at all facilities. The shuttle also offers scheduled shopping trips each day of the week to locations like the Bennett Valley Center on Mondays, Montgomery Village on Tuesdays, St. Francis Center and Montecito Olivers on Wednesdays, Farmers Lane CVS and the 4th Street Safeway on Thursdays, and the St. Francis Center again on Fridays.

The City of Santa Rosa is considering routing changes for Route 16, partially due to a decrease in ridership, and is inviting Oakmont's engagement to identify possible changes. Call (707) 543-3333 for questions and comments, or visit SRCityBus.org.

Nominations Now Open for 2025 Board Election

Nominations are now open for four positions on the OVA Board to be filled in the 2025 OVA Board of Directors election. The last day to submit nominations is Thursday, Jan. 9.

The four directors whose seats are up are Steve Spillman, Mark Randol, Olga Ydrogo, and Jess Marzak, who was voted in by the board in November to take the seat of David Dearden.

Oakmont members who are in good standing can declare their candidacy by letter, which must be postmarked or delivered by Jan. 9. Letters may also be dropped off by the same date at the OVA office, 6637 Oakmont Drive, Suite A, or emailed to Dawn McFarland (Dawn@oakmontvillage.com).

Candidates must also send a candidate's statement of up to 300 words, and a photo, by Thursday, Feb. 6. The profiles and photos will be published in the

Oakmont News.

Those seeking seats on the board will take part in Candidates' Night on Wednesday, Feb. 19, starting at 6 p.m. in the Berger Center. Members will have an opportunity to submit questions. Other candidate's forums will be announced as they are scheduled.

If there are the same number or fewer qualified candidates than the four open positions, the board of directors may vote to seat the qualified candidates by acclamation without member balloting.

Ballots for the election will be mailed to members by early March. Results of the election will be announced at the 2025 Annual Meeting on April 7. Voting is by mail. Ballots may also be turned in at the Annual Meeting at the Berger Center prior to the start of ballot counting at 10 a.m.

Fire Safety in the Home

Editor's Note: Katy Carrel, co-chair of MYN in Oakmont, has been collaborating with SR fire officials to bring periodic columns of interest and safety for Oakmont members.

Fire safety is a top priority, particularly in a community where many residents may face mobility or health challenges. Ensuring that everyone understands, and practices fire safety can greatly reduce the risk of accidents and save lives. Here are some important tips to help keep the members of Oakmont safe from fire hazards.

Smoke alarms are vital in saving lives because they provide early warnings of fire in the home. That early detection allows people ample time to escape before the fire and smoke become too intense. It is important to put smoke alarms in every level of your home, specifically inside bedrooms and outside sleeping areas, and test them monthly using the test button. If you cannot hear the smoke alarm when you sleep, buy an alarm with special aid devices like a bright light or bed shaker.

Cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires. In fact, the crew of Santa Rosa Fire Department Station 7 responded to almost a dozen cooking-related fires in the Oakmont community in 2023. These fires can be prevented by always staying in the kitchen when you are cooking, and turning the pot handles toward the back of the stove so they can't be knocked off the burner. If a fire does start, attempt to put it out with a fire extinguisher if you are comfortable and stay calm and get out. Call 911 and have a meeting place a safe distance where first responders can see you.

Everyone should have a plan in case of a fire or other emergency in their home, including knowing two ways out of the home and clearing all clutter that may block your escape route or create a trip hazard. Practice this escape plan at least twice a year.

JANUARY 5: DR. MINNA SCHMIDT, BUCK INSTITUTE EXERCISE, TUMMY ACHES AND PARKINSON'S

DIJON, FRANCE: 2024 MEN'S TRIPLES WORLD CUP

In a thrilling final lasting more than two hours, Italy beat Madagascar 13-11 to win the 51st Men's Triples World Championship earlier this month in Dijon, France. Italy last won the World Cup in 1979. A video of the Italy-Madagascar final match can be seen here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=sH-YGkb7NRI.

In the initial five-match qualifying round, only Italy and France won all five matches. For the World Cup, each then advanced in its own bracket toward the finals, but France lost to Madagascar 13-3 in the semi-finals. Ironically, Madagascar won four of its five qualifying matches, losing only to Italy 4-13.

Forty-eight national teams competed. The World Cup, held every two years, begins with five qualifying matches using the "Swiss System" of scoring. The Swiss System pits winners against winners and losers against losers in the successive games with all teams then ranked according to their number of wins at the end of the qualifying round.

The top 24 teams begin single elimination competition for the World Cup, while the next 24 teams begin single elimination competition for the Nations Cup (consolante). The top 16 teams in each division, divided into two brackets, then compete in single elimination for the final four rounds. Mauritius beat Tahiti 13-7 to win the Nations Cup. The US

finished the qualifying rounds in 25th place, missing the World Cup by one place, and lost to Norway 4-13 in its first Nations Cup match.

A companion competition, Precision Shooting, is held in conjunction with the Men's Triples competition. Madagascar's shooter, Jean-François Rakotondrainibé, won the 17th Men's World Precision Shooting championship. The 2024 World Cup began in controversy when the Fédération Internationale de Pétanque et Jeu Provençal disqualified the Thai national team, the defending champions, because of misconduct allegations against the Thai federation president.

LEGION 100: INNOVATION AND INVENTION A TALK BY A DOCENT OF THE SAN FRANCISCO ART MUSEUMS

2024 marks the 100th anniversary of the opening of the Legion of Honor, home to one of the world's outstanding collections of Rodin sculpture and European art. The Legion of Honor owes its existence to the vision of enterprising San Franciscan Alma de Bretteville Spreckels, who set out to build a museum to showcase French art and dedicated to the California men who died in France during World War I.

This talk tells the fascinating story of how the museum was modeled after the Legion of Honor in Paris and

would come to be built on a hill with a breathtaking view of the San Francisco Bay. Featuring a treasure trove of historic images, the talk highlights some of the building's beautiful original architectural features as well as renovations undertaken over the past 100 years.

The Legion of Honor's moving inaugural ceremonies of 1924 and the art objects that were on display in the galleries on opening day will also be discussed in this exploration of an important chapter of San Francisco history.

The talk will be given by Docent Christina Crosby. Christina Crosby graduated in Art History from Pomona College. After attending Loyola Law School and a 30-year legal career focused on helping public agencies and non-profit organizations raise money for capital projects through the issuance of bonds, she returned to her first love of Art History by entering the Docent program at the Fine Arts Museums in 2011.

In addition to giving lectures throughout the Bay Area, Christina shares her love of art with museum visitors at both the de Young and Legion of Honor. She also loves to travel, with museums always a featured part of the itinerary.
