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Free Spring Concert with New Horizons Band

Sonoma County's New Horizons Band, a talented group of music-making seniors, will present their free Spring Concert on Saturday, March 29, at 2 p.m. in the Berger Center.

The event kicks off with a spirited march by Finland's greatest composer, Jean Sibelius. From there, the audience will take a musical journey to New Orleans with Louis "Satchmo" Armstrong's timeless hits, followed by Glenn Miller's #1 classic, "A String of Pearls," which is sure to get everyone dancing.

"A Song of Hope" offers reflective moments leading to the world premiere of "Gary Matthews," a trumpet quartet commissioned in honor of a beloved Sonoma County musician. Next, the New Horizons trombones will take center stage with "Shoutin' Liza Trombone," followed by the entire brass section shining in Scott Joplin's lively "Sunflower Slow Drag."

In "Fiesta La Vida," a piece inspired by the vibrant Mariachi culture and dedicated to a young musician, you'll hear the unique rhythms and melodies of this



rich tradition.

The program continues with "Synthesis," a contemporary composition that opens with a bold fanfare and commanding percussion before highlighting the winds and strings. Finally, the concert concludes with "One Life Beautiful," an impressionistic free-form piece celebrating the beauty and significance of a single, precious life.

Central Complex Project Progress Report

At the March 18 OVA board meeting director Matt Oliver gave an update on the Central Complex project. Below is his report.

I'd like to provide you with an update and some positive news regarding the Central Complex process. After the Board requested that I work closely with Nordby Construction to improve the clarity of the figures and data, I'm pleased to report that we are making significant progress.

First, it's important to clarify that, contrary to some

misconceptions, the Board has not yet received any formal cost report from Archilogix on cost figures. What we have received so far are numbers that alone don't provide a clear, comprehensive report for discussion or decision-making.

We have shared in prior meetings that Mitch Connor (Architect) did submit a report to the board, but that was his report on how he got to the different concepts and what he would recommend as phasing options. Not a cost report.

OVA Reissuing Ballots in Board Election

Due to the inadvertent omission of one candidate's biography in the election package, the Inspector of Elections has advised OVA to reissue ballots in the board election. Unfortunately, this means votes will not be counted until May 5. This timeframe allows the required 30 days for members to cast their ballots and accommodates the Inspector's schedule.

The new ballots are expected to be in homes by March 27, and will be printed on yellow paper. Any blue ballots that have been received by the inspector will be discarded. These first ballots will not be counted under any circumstances, regardless of when sent or received. Members who have already sent in a blue ballot will need to send in a new yellow ballot for their votes to be counted.

The current OVA Board will serve until May 5, when the Annual Meeting will begin at 10 a.m. Following the close of nominations and balloting at approximately 10:05 a.m., the ballots will be counted. Once the vote tabulation is complete, the results of the 2025 Election of Directors will be announced at 2 p.m., the new board members will be seated, and the Annual Meeting will be adjourned.

COMMUNITY CONVERSATIONS: SOCIAL ISOLATION

The Oakmont Aging in Place working group invites you to an educational forum on Social Isolation.

Experiencing personal loss—such as the death of a loved one, or a decline in hearing, vision, mobility, or independence—can lead to isolation during periods of grief. This withdrawal, whether short-term or long-term, may contribute to feelings of loneliness.

The outgoing U.S. Surgeon General, Dr. Vivek Murthy, has described loneliness as an epidemic, stating: "... loneliness is like hunger and thirst, that it's a natural signal our body sends us when we're lacking something we need for survival—in this case social connection." He further emphasizes that the antidote for loneliness is community.

We encourage all Oakmont residents to join us for brief presentations and small group discussions on this vital topic. Together, we can build connections and strengthen our community.

Consent Calendar: New Board Director of Oakmont Village Property Corporation—Gary Smith. **Committee Reports:**

Architectural: Onboarding new volunteers as part of preparing for routine staff turn-over. Lots of solar applications. Otherwise, business as usual.

Oakmont Emergency Preparedness: A new FRS/GMRS antenna has been mounted on the back of the CAC building to be used by our zone communicator network radios. The height and length of the new antenna allows us to talk out to any part of Oakmont and to receive from anywhere in Oakmont. Stations have been set up at each Rec Center to talk to East, Central and West Oakmont.

Now we can support emergency communications with fewer volunteers from a single point inside the CAC. This could be critical during an extended shelter-in-place event. Weekly ham and monthly ZC radio nets are being held on schedule. Preparing for the next Fire and Earthquake Safe Fair in the Berger Center on April 24 and the next Oakmont emergency drill on April 26.

Governing Documents: A multi-phased strategy for updating the Oakmont bylaws and governing docs, which would require a community-wide vote, received approval from the Board of Directors. No timetable was included in

If you weren't able to get all your vaccines at the last Oakmont clinic days, you're in luck. OVA is once again hosting a Vaccine Clinic Day on Friday, April 25 and Thursday, May 15 at the Berger Center, 9 a.m.-3

This vaccine clinic is offering second dose 2024-25 COVID (Pfizer), RSV (ages 60+), Shingles (Shignrix), Pneumonia (Prevnar 20) and Tetanus (Tdap).

The CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommends that people aged 65 and older, as well as those who are moderately or severely immunocompromised, receive a second dose of the 2024-2025 COVID-19 vaccine six months after their first dose.

Please bring your medical and prescription card to the clinic at the time of your appointment, your CDC vaccination card or digital record of vaccines, plus the printed version of the consent form you receive at the time of booking your appointment. MARCH MEETING— OUR CLUB AND OUR CONSTITUTION

Responses to our membership survey were discussed at our March meeting. Topics ranged from a potential name change to frequency and focus of our meetings and volunteer support of our club.

Alison Moon, Convention of States State Director, District Captain—CA 8, joined us via Zoom. A long-time volunteer for COS, she has been in her current position for three years.

Key points of Alison's talk about a potential Article V, COS were:

- Only one group is working on bringing about a COS.
- Only three issues are being proposed: 1. Limit power and Jurisdiction of the federal government; 2. Impose fiscal restraints on the federal government; 3. Establish term limits on federal officials.
- 34 states must agree to submit applications limiting the COS to the above topic(s). So far, 20 states are on board to call a COS and if called, then to discuss, draft and vote on amendment proposals germane to the topic(s) stated in the applications.
- 38 states must then ratify any amendment(s) proposal before any amendment(s) can be added to the US Constitution.

Alison pointed out, due to our founding fathers instituting monumental checks and balances to call and eventually ratify any proposed amendment(s), it is "politically impossible for any change to be made to our Constitution without the overwhelming support of 'We, The People'." They afforded us a way to counter a runaway Congress. She quoted Constitutional scholar Professor Robert Natelson saying, "There are far more checks on a runaway convention than on a runaway Congress."

Monthly meetings are on the fourth Tuesdays, 4–6 p.m., in the Berger (6633 Oakmont Dr). Food and beverage are welcome.

Oakmont committees providing information at the fair include the Firewise Resource Task Force, OEPTF (Oakmont Emergency Preparedness Task Force for communications), and MYN (Meet Your Neighbors, the official emergency prep task force. Importantly, responding to other community misconceptions, the Board has not endorsed, approved, or otherwise made any decisions about any particular concept or components of any of the concepts presented at this stage.

As we work toward obtaining more accurate figures for a comprehensive report to the Board and community, several factors must be thoroughly analyzed before we can compile reliable data. Such figures will serve as framework for understanding potential expenses and exploring different scenarios. However, they remain preliminary and are not detailed enough to support Board discussion let alone decision-making at this stage.

In collaboration with Nordby, we are working diligently to identify these figures and to ensure they capture other details needing to be included in overall figures. We will also need to factor in other cost components, including architectural and engineering services, permits, and contingency amounts.

Additionally, to inform any decision-making on any master plan, the board will also utilize the OVA facilities audit to assess the current condition of our facilities, available reserve funds, and ongoing operating costs. This information will support a cost-benefit analysis to guide us toward the most effective approach for master planning efforts. A comprehensive report will be shared with the board and community once all relevant information is compiled.

I appreciate everyone's continued patience as we work through these complex details, and I will keep you informed as we make further progress.

the resolution that passed on a 4-2 vote. The matter was referred to the Communications Committee to propose an implementation strategy.

Meet Your Neighbors: MYN is exploring creating a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) in partnership with the national CERT organization to support first responders. Plans include developing a shelter at OVA facilities for those unable to evacuate, with Red Cross assistance for cots and food. The OVA manager is discussing this proposed partnership with attorney and insurance company. Red Cross to coordinate efforts. Emergency preparedness training for administrative and maintenance staff is also in progress. Currently, 55% of homes participate in the MYN program.

Central Complex Area Update: See feature story.

Two Committees: No formal proposals have been made yet, but two committees are under discussion: one to review and closely assess information from Nordby regarding the central complex area, and the other to revive the Oakmont Community Development Committee. The latter would monitor developments affecting Oakmont, such as the old Elnoka property, the luxury hotel under construction in Kenwood, and the Sonoma Developmental Center (SDC).


Exercise runs in their family: Ann is a former aerobics instructor and their kids participated in baseball, soccer and swimming.



Taking its name from the famed violinist Efrem Zimbalist, a towering presence at the Curtis Institute of Music, they carry on his legacy through a total commitment to artistic excellence based on their own studies at Curtis.

For their upcoming appearance they have chosen a delightful program including a work by Dvorak's son-in-law Joseph Suk, together with two pillars of the piano trio repertoire. Beethoven's so-called "Ghost" trio exposes a shift in his compositional style compared to his previous four piano trios which were mostly representative of an early classical, Haydnesque period. This opus 70 work displays a more mature Beethoven leaning towards a greater degree of Romanticism.

The program will conclude with the much-loved Brahms trio in C major, written at a particularly prolific period in Brahms' life—around 1880—when he was working on the monumental second piano concerto and his third symphony.

Please note that we will be presenting the Program Roster for our 2025-2026 season at this concert. I think you will appreciate the variety of artists that have been engaged, so bring your checkbooks as we will be selling our full season and mini-season passes.

As previously indicated, we will also honor Bob Hayden's legacy this event. As you may know, Bob passed away on February 22.

Pickleball Corner

BEWARE THE BRITISH LOB

In British dialect the word "lob" means a slow, heavy, dull-witted person. I can surmise, with all due restraint, that is not normally the case in the Oakmont Pickleball Club. At the 3.0 to 3.5 rec level, a really good lobber can make you feel something akin to that: chasing instead of playing. Instead of just reacting and scrambling, let's flip the script—turn their best weapon against them.

Rather than treating lobs as a nuisance, use them as an opportunity to take control of the game. This strategy isn't just about defending against lobs—it's about forcing errors, disrupting their rhythm, and making the lobber regret their own game plan. How?

Step 1: Make Their Lobs a Liability: Lobbers Thrive on Comfortable Setups. Don't give it to them. How you take

that away: 1. Hit to their feet; 2. Speed up the game; 3. Move them side to side.

Step 2: Use Their Own Strategy Against Them: Most Lobbers Struggle Against... Lobs! How to test their lob defense: 1. Target them with deep high lobs; 2. Make them run backwards.

Step 3: The Midcourt Trap—Where Lobbers Struggle. How to force a lobber into the midcourt: 1. Drop shots that land in the transition zone; 2. Attack their body; 3. Hit slice dinks that dies near their feet.

Step 4: Anticipate and Preempt Their Lobs. How to know when a lob is coming: 1. Watch their paddle angle; 2. Pay attention to their court position: 3. Notice their body countermove.


9-BALL DOUBLE ELIMINATION POOL TOURNAMENT


On March 6,the Oakmont Billiards Club held a thrilling 9-ball double-elimination tournament.


Library Matters

BIRDS WORTH WATCHING: RED-WINGED BLACKBIRDS

Step outside these days in the early morning and you'll hear a lively chorus of birds. As spring arrives, everyone wants their song to be heard. And no bird does it better than the Red-winged Blackbird. The male's song, a lovely, liquid "Conk-la-ree!", is delivered with ringing enthusiasm that's a guaranteed spring pick-me-up, like seeing a daffodil flirting with the breeze.

Red-winged Blackbirds are both plentiful and unique-looking—the males, that is—to the point where almost everyone knows them. Slightly smaller than a robin, they're solid black except for their brilliant red epaulets, sometimes bordered with yellow. Females look completely different; they're mottled brown with buffy streaks A female considers like large sparrows.

These Blackbirds congregate anywhere near water: lakes, ponds, marshes, or, in Oakmont's case, golf course water hazards. They typically live in large flocks, often segregated by sex, until spring, when males stake out a nesting territory and do everything they can to attract

as many females as possible. You'll see them not just down near the water but also high in trees, flashing their colorful wing patches and singing their hearts

They may mate with and defend as many as 15 partners in one season—quite a harem, though not always faithful (some of the chicks raised don't belong to their male defender). Females build complicated nests suspended among reeds and cattails near the water. After the young are fledged, the flocks head out for vineyards and open fields to feed on fruits and seeds into the fall and winter.

No need to be an early-bird to hear them because Red-winged Blackbirds sing all day long. They're performing now! Keep an ear out for "Conk-laree!"—the essence of spring.
