The Central Pool is the only facility in Oakmont welcoming guests under the age of 17. The OVA invites residents' grandchildren and young guests to enjoy additional swimming hours during these warmer months.

To ensure a safe and enjoyable experience for everyone, please remember the following facility pool rules:

- Children (17 years of age or younger) must be accompanied by an Oakmont resident or an adult 18 years or older with a valid guest card during children's hours.
- All pool patrons must shower before entering the pool.
- No food or drink (other than water in a plastic bottle), and no glass are allowed in the pool area.
- No jumping, diving, or running on the pool deck.
- Children under 18 are not allowed in the Jacuzzis.
- No diapered children are allowed in the pool.
- All guests must have a guest card or be accompanied by an Oakmont resident.
- The capacity limit of the Central Pool is 60 guests.

If you have questions about the rules or believe someone is violating the rules, please email askova@oakmontvillage.com, or contact the OVA Office at (707) 539-1611. We ask residents to not police the pools themselves but to allow the OVA staff to handle any issues.

Oakmont's Newest Neighborhood

Willow Glen is Oakmont's newest neighborhood, with six homes recently coming on the market. The annexation of the three duplexes on Stone Bridge and Oakmont drives fully incorporates the neighborhood into OVA membership, benefits and community services.

The homes are owner maintained. OVA will receive \$130,000 in development impact fees. OVA's capital investment fund has not had an infusion of impact fees for several years, as land for new construction was unavailable.

GOLF COURSE MAINTENANCE

The maintenance team has successfully completed the bunker improvement project on the Valley of the Moon course. Since December 2024, 37 bunkers have been renovated in-house (36 at Valley of the Moon and 1 at Sugarloaf).

With warmer weather and irrigation season underway, the crew is actively testing and adjusting irrigation systems while addressing challenges like English daisies and gophers on the playing surfaces.

Updates include filling the #7 fairway bunker at Valley of the Moon with seed. The area is roped off, and grass is already germinating.

Alternatively, you can write a note on the scratch paper located near the front door. Slide it under my office door or place it in the mail slot just around the corner from my office. Again, please include your name and phone number for follow-up purposes.

If you are using a machine and notice it making strange noises, stop using it immediately to avoid causing further damage. Maintaining the Fitness Center equipment is a community effort, and together we can keep everything in excellent condition.



JUNE 19: INTERMEDIATE HIKE SALT POINT

Please note earlier start time. Beautiful walk along the bluffs from Gerstle Cove to Stump Beach. Lunch at Stump Beach. Fascinating tafoni rock formations, probably still lots of wildflowers, 4 miles, 285 ft. elevation gain to Stump Beach and back.

Optional stop at Fort Ross State Park on the way back to visit the excellent little museum chronicling the Russian presence on the coast, tour the reconstructed fort with one original building, possibly also visit the orchard and cemetery. Adds 0 to about 4 miles, 0-278 ft. elevation gain depending on how much of the site you wish to visit.

Bring lunch, water, sunscreen and hat, poles if needed. Long pants and sleeves recommended, as there may be patches of poison oak. Jacket also recommended as it can be quite cool and windy along the bluffs. Restrooms at trailhead and at Fort Ross. 1 hour 45 minutes-drive to trailhead. State Park Pass needed at Gerstle Cove and Fort Ross or \$9 per vehicle.

JUNE 19: LONG HIKE HISTORIC CHINA CAMP STATE PARK IN NOVATO



China Camp Trail Map.

This is a 9.4-mile loop trail overlooking the San Pablo Bay, near Novato. Generally considered a moderately challenging route, it takes an average of 3 h. 38 min to complete.

This is a very popular area for birding, camping, and hiking, so you'll likely encounter other people while exploring. The trail is open year-round and is beautiful to visit anytime. The park is named in remembrance of the Chinese fishing village that existed in the area in the 1880s. Shrimp netted in the area were shipped back to China and to Chinese communities throughout the area. Today there is a campground and a wonderful system of trails and views of San Pablo Bay. Deer, coyote, fox, and a variety of birds call the area home.

Bring poles, lunch and plenty of water as there isn't much shade and it can be warm. Bonnie's Brownies will be served. Depart the Berger parking lot at 8:30 a.m. Hike leader is Gary Andersen, (360) 778-9604.

JUNE 26: MARE ISLAND NATIONAL HISTORIC LANDMARK

Mare Island became the first United States naval base on the West Coast in 1854. Closed in 1996, it was conveyed to the City of Vallejo in 2002 for reuse and redevelopment. We will hike a level 5-6 miles through a treasure trove of history with views of the historic shipyard, officers' quarters, hospital base and possibly the chapel. Check back later in the month for details on the chapel.

The *Balclutha*, *C.A. Thayer*, and *Eppleton Hall* historic ships from the San Francisco Hyde Street Pier are now berthed at Mare Island. Option to dine after the hike at Mare Island Brewing Company opposite these ships or bring snack/lunch.

JUNE 26: LONG HIKE TRIONE-ANNADEL STATE PARK

Starting from the turtle pond at the East Rec. we hike through Frey Canyon to the Lawndale Trail. After passing historic Gordenker Quarry we surround Ledson Marsh before it dries up. About 9 miles and 1,500 ft. of elevation.

Bring water, lunch and appropriate attire. Leave from the Berger Center at 8:30 a.m. Hike leader is John Ferreira, (650) 766-0497.







YOUR ANCESTORS' INNER CIRCLE

The next meeting of the Genealogy Club will be June 23 at 1 p.m. in East and on Zoom (Zoom links below).

The topic will be the FAN Club and Cluster Analysis. These are two related approaches to understanding more about your ancestor—they help with research and they also give you a deeper understanding of what their lives were like.

The FAN club usually refers to Friends, Associates, Neighbors. Using these concepts, you can identify people who were important in your ancestor's life. Think about those who lived next door or in a nearby farm, think about people they worked with, think about people they went to church with. Maybe you can find your ancestor in the 1870 census but not the 1880 census. Look at their neighbors in 1870. Maybe your ancestor still lives next door in 1880 but their name is mis-indexed.

Cluster Analysis broadens this to include extended family members and others, like witnesses at a wedding, who may have been important to them. Think about a favorite sibling or cousin.

INVESTING IN TREASURIES AND BONDS VERSUS EQUITIES IN THE MARKET

The next meeting of InvestOAK will occur on Friday, June 20.

At the time of this writing on May 27, the U.S. Bond market is in turmoil as the Treasury is having trouble selling its bonds into the world market even with increasing yields. To entice buyers, the 10-year Treasury Bond yield increased to 4.55% on Friday, May 23.

The stock market had been increasing steadily, but dropped by 1.5% when Moody dropped the credit rating of U.S. Treasuries from the highest AAA by a notch. What this increased risk may mean to retail investors like us will be discussed at the upcoming InvestOAK meeting.

The progress of the administration's tariff negotiations with the European Union, China and the rest of the world was postponed until July. A discussion will ensue about how tariffs potentially will affect the world investment atmosphere. A great deal can happen in the coming weeks leading up to the next meeting. Investors in the U.S. stock markets would clearly prefer that tariffs be put on the back burner.

The following topics will also be discussed:

- Will the final budget proposed to Congress lower the National Debt and decrease the deficit?
- What are the advantages of corporate, federal and municipal bonds?
- Why are preferred stocks better than common stocks?
